<u>Director Davis Retirement:</u> On Thursday morning, DODD shared Governor DeWine's announcement that Director Jeff Davis will retire at the end of the year. Current Deputy Director Kim Hauck has been appointed the new DODD Director and will assume the role on January 1st, 2022. Director Davis' calm and thoughtful approach, compassion for people with disabilities and their families, as well as his understanding of the issues impacting providers have been invaluable during the tumultuous last few years and we are thankful for his leadership. Serving as OPRA's long-time Government Relations Director, then President/CEO before taking the lead at DODD, Director Davis is part of the OPRA family and we wish him the best in his retirement. Director Davis will join us for next Friday morning's 8:30 call.



JMOC: Yesterday, the Ohio legislature's Joint Medicaid Oversight Committee held a hearing focusing on the proposed spending plan for American Rescue Plan (ARPA) prepared by the Ohio Department of Medicaid. Several weeks back, OPRA and our workforce coalition sent this letter to the administration, outlining our concerns with the proposed plan, and advocating for shifting funding towards direct provider relief payments. The letter, and its revised funding proposal were the focus of much of the hearing. ODM Director Maureen Corcoran defended Ohio's plan, making the case that the spending proposal addresses long-term Medicaid system improvements over one-time relief payments. We will continue to advocate for a plan that maximizes the much-needed relief funding for providers allocated through the American Rescue Plan. The entire hearing can be viewed here.

HB169: This bill appropriated the ARPA funding for the enhanced FMAP for home and community-based services as well as appropriated at least \$42 million in funding for ICF relief. The ICF payments will be limited to direct care staff compensation, which may include staff retention bonus payments, overtime pay and shift differential payments, staff recruitment payments, and new hire incentive payment." The HCBS payments will be contingent on CMS's approval of Ohio's spending plan submitted in October. Additional information will be forthcoming from The Ohio Department of Medicaid and Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities on both appropriates. You can read more about the bill here. The bill now awaits the Governor's signature.

<u>Senate Vaccine Vote:</u> Earlier this week, <u>the US Senate voted 52-48 to overturn President Biden's vaccine mandate_for private businesses with 100 or more employees (OSHA). This really doesn't appear that it will go anywhere as it would need to pass the house, then it would go to the President's desk where he would most certainly veto it. So this is mostly a symbolic move – still it got some democratic votes along with all republican votes.</u>

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The Department provides the following weekly MUI updates based on COVID-19 related unanticipated hospitalizations and/or deaths entered into the Incident Tracking System. This data is not all inclusive. It does not include information about people who were suspected of having COVID-19 but not hospitalized, those who tested positive but were not hospitalized, people living with their families who were hospitalized when there was no provider present at time of hospitalization and COVID tested. As of December 10, 2021:

COVID-19 Testing Results for Reportable MUIs

- 1,330 people served have tested positive for COVID-19 and been hospitalized. There were 22 additional positives since the 12/3 report.
- There were 22 additional hospitalizations since the 12/3 report. This is a total of 2,267 people hospitalized and tested for COVID-19.
- A total of 2,392 COVID-19 reportable MUIs have been filed as 126 individuals were never hospitalized but COVID-19 was suspected or later determined as their cause of death.
- 292 people served have passed away who have tested positive for COVID-19. There were 4 additional confirmed deaths since the 12/3 report.

Impacted Counties/Developmental Centers:

- There are 86 counties and 8 developmental centers with COVID related MUIs (CADC, CDC, GDC, TDC, MVDC, SODC, WDC and NODC).
- Franklin had the most people hospitalized and tested with 245 followed by Cuyahoga with 229.
- · Cuyahoga had the most people tested positive with 135 and Franklin had 122.

Testing Demographics:

- Males accounted for 59.88% of those tested and females 40.12%.
- Ages of people tested ranged from 1 to 95 years. The average age was 56 years. The most common ages are 62.
- The breakdown of people tested by race is:
 - Black or African American-15% (56% positive testing rate)
 - Other Race -2% (56% positive testing rate)
 - Unknown-5% (52% positive testing rate)
 - White/Caucasian 78% (55% positive testing rate)

COVID-19 Deaths:

- · The mortality rate of those passing from COVID-19 (292) and the total people served (98,956) is 0.2950%.
- · The ages of those who died range from 4-95 years of age.
- The average age of the person who died was 61 years old.
- · A total of 68 counties and 3 DCs (CDC, NODC, TDC) have reported COVID-19 deaths
- Franklin has the most confirmed COVID deaths with 23.
