<u>Vaccine Mandate:</u> This week we had our call with CMS. During the call we had 2 CMS officials provide more clarification in regards to the requirement of contracted service providers needing to be vaccinated. CMS stated during the call that the authors of the QSO memo have stated that the requirement is meant for those providing care WITHIN the facility. The focus of the IFR is on staff INSIDE the facility and not those providing service outside the facility. The ICF MAY choose to add vaccination status to their contracts for day services. The survey process for this tag will be much the same process as other survey tasks. CMS will require information just for the facility they are surveying. And if a staff member works across multiple ICF facilities for the organization, the provider would just need to ensure that their name and vaccination status is on each facilities list.

Representative Scott Oelslager, who is the Chairman of the House Finance Committee. This is one meeting in a series of meeting with legislators across the state. OPRA members did a great job sharing information about the negative impact of the workforce crisis on people receiving services and providers. The Representative has a lot of experience with our system and was eager to discuss what it will take to get through the crisis. We will be following up with the Representative to share our thoughts, data, and strategies. We would like to thank Bill Green, the superintendent of the Stark

County Board of DD, who hosted this very important legislative meeting with chairman Oelslager,

who will be a key ally as we seek meaningful rate increases in the next biennium budget.

<u>ARPA-</u> We are still awaiting final approval from CMS on both the ARPA EFAMP for HCBS providers and the associated Appendix k application and the 1135 application to be able to disperse the funding that was <u>appropriated under HB 169</u>. We have started to get some questions as you all patiently wait for this process to play itself out, about any guidance on how the money can be spent once it is deposited in your accounts and any type of reporting requirements that may or may not be required. ODM is working through these questions and plans to put out guidance when everything is approved. I know there are a lot of unanswered questions you all have, but we hope to have clear guidance on any reporting requirements in the near future.

Advocacy Army: We are finally ready to roll out the Advocacy Army! We will be hosting an informational session on 2/15 at 8:30 via Zoom. We will give an overview of the curriculum, participation requirements, and our outcome goals for Advocacy Army. The info session is designed for provider admins who are interested in learning more about the curriculum. Attending the session is not a prerequisite for participating in Advocacy Army, but it is strongly encouraged. The session will be recorded if you are unable to join us. <u>Public Health Emergency: The Federal PHE has been extended to mid-April</u>, with an 'unwinding time' now extending until October 2022. The extension of the PHE allows Ohio to submit additional appendix K applications as needed and continues the enhanced FMAP appropriated in the FFCRA.

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COVID-19 Testing Results for Reportable MUIs-January 27, 2022

- 1,524 people served have tested positive for COVID-19 and been hospitalized. There were 24 additional positives since the 1/21 report.
- There were 25 additional hospitalizations since the 1/21 report. This is a total of 2,462 people hospitalized and tested for COVID-19.
- A total of 2,612 COVID-19 reportable MUIs have been filed as 150 individuals were never hospitalized but COVID-19 was suspected or later determined as their cause of death.
- 331 people served have passed away who have tested positive for COVID-19. There were 10 additional confirmed deaths since the 1/21 report.

Impacted Counties/Developmental Centers:

- There are 86 counties and 8 developmental centers with COVID related MUIs (CADC, CDC, GDC, TDC, MVDC, SODC, WDC and NODC).
- Franklin had the most people hospitalized and tested with 263 followed by Cuyahoga with 253.
- Cuyahoga had the most people tested positive with 156 and Franklin had 140.

Testing Demographics:

- Males accounted for 59.46% of those tested and females 40.54%.
- Ages of people tested ranged from 1 to 95 years. The average age was 54 years. The most common ages are 62.
- The breakdown of people tested by race is:
 - Black or African American-14% (56% positive testing rate)
 - Other Race -2% (56% positive testing rate)
 - Unknown-5% (52% positive testing rate)
 - White/Caucasian 79% (56% positive testing rate)

COVID-19 Deaths:

- The mortality rate of those passing from COVID-19 (331) and the total people served (98,956) is 0.334%. The ages of those who died range from 4-95 years of age.
 The average age of the person who died was 60 years old.
 A total of 67 counties and 4 DCs (CDC, MVDC, NODC, TDC) have reported COVID-19 deaths.
 Franklin has the most confirmed COVID deaths with 26.

The Department provides this weekly MUI updates based on COVID-19 related unanticipated hospitalizations and/or deaths entered into the Incident Tracking System. This data is not all inclusive. It does not include information about people who were suspected of having COVID-19 but not hospitalized, those who tested positive but were not hospitalized, people living with their families who were hospitalized when there was no provider present at time of hospitalization and COVID tested.
