DODD Staff Transitions: Over the past few days, DODD has announced several staff transitions, following the retirement of Kelly Miller, long-time Deputy Director of DODD's compliance and accreditation departments. Succeeding Kelly as the lead of the OSASS unit will be Lyndsay Nash, currently part of DODD's legal and oversight department. Stacy Collins will be the Assistant Deputy Director of Quality & Innovation and Beth Chambers has been named the lead on the statewide implementation of the Ohio ISP. ICF Cap & Rollback: As we continue to advocate for a fix to the prior state budget's ICF language that leads to a 'cap & rollback' of the rate, we've learned this week that our legislative allies are planning to draft an amendment into a current bill intended to be heard soon in the Senate Health Committee. We have heard that there is support for both the House and Senate leadership for this amendment. We will know more soon as to any advocacy efforts that we need to make so will be sure to keep the membership posted.

Blueprint: DODD's Rule & Waiver sub-committee met last week to move forward with the implementation of proposals emerging from the Blueprint committee. The primary focus of the meeting was an introduction to the 'Independent Rate Model' framework being used by the Milliman group to develop rate methodologies for potential changes to day array and employment services. There was also a robust discussion on 'provider types' and the different types and levels of professionals who provide services under the day array umbrella. The primary focus is on the 'non-work' proposal, which is intended to simplify and clarify expectations for the Adult Day Support service. ICF Reviews: We have heard from several members across the state regarding issues with the vaccine mandate and ODH surveyors, specifically regarding contracted services, mostly day services. This is an issue we have sought clarity on since the earliest days of the mandate, and it does not appear that these citations are in alignment with the interpretations offered by CMS. We have also heard of condition-level citations, which contradicts past discussions with CMS regarding 'good faith efforts' in coming into compliance with the mandate. COVID-19 Testing Results for Reportable MUIs			
Negative	Pending	Positive	Total
1,131	0	1,624	2,755

- 1,624 people served have tested positive for COVID-19 and been hospitalized. There were **8** additional positives since the 5/13 report.
- There were **11** additional hospitalizations since the 5/13 report. This is a total of 2,577 people hospitalized and tested for COVID-19.
- A total of 2,755 COVID-19 reportable MUIs have been filed as 178 individuals were never hospitalized but COVID-19 was suspected or later determined as their cause of death.
- 382 people served have passed away who have tested positive for COVID-19. There were **0** additional confirmed deaths since the 5/13 report.

Impacted Counties/Developmental Centers:

- There are 87 counties and 8 developmental centers with COVID related MUIs (CADC, CDC, GDC, TDC, MVDC, SODC, WDC and NODC).
- Franklin had the most people hospitalized and tested with 269 followed by Cuyahoga with 263.
- Cuyahoga had the most people tested positive with 166 and Franklin had 147.

Testing Demographics:

- Males accounted for 59.09% of those tested and females 40.91%.
- Ages of people tested ranged from 11 months to 95 years. The average age was 54 years. The most common ages are 59.
- The breakdown of people tested by race is:
 - Black or African American-14% (60% positive testing rate)
 - Other Race -2% (56% positive testing rate)
 - Unknown-5% (52% positive testing rate)
 - White/Caucasian 79% (59% positive testing rate)

COVID-19 Deaths:

- The mortality rate of those passing from COVID-19 (382) and the total people served (98,956) is 0.386%.
- The ages of those who died range from 11 months-95 years of age.
- The average age of the person who died was 60 years old.
- A total of 70 counties and 4 DCs (CDC, MVDC, NODC, TDC) have reported COVID-19 deaths.
- Franklin has the most confirmed COVID deaths with 30.
